## President's Message -- Rob Larsen

I hope this newsletter finds you all healthy and happy. The holidays are a great time of year and I hope that you had a Merry Christmas. 2020 has been a challenging year to be sure. I really miss being able to meet and see you all and hope we can begin meeting again soon. With the majority of us being older, I think being careful is the best practice. That said, beginning in January we will start having monthly board meetings via Zoom. It is about the best we can do for a while. We will begin having general meetings as soon as guidelines allow.

There are lots of things going on with the biggest being the closure to boat fishing on the Olympic Peninsula. This has been driven by low wild fish forecasts and poor returns last year. Bottom line is, fishing from shore is better than not fishing. I have been actively working with James Losee (Region 6 Manager) to make sure the fish we save make it to the gravel. I spoke in the commission meeting and continue to push for equity with comanagers and improved sportsman opportunity.

As far as other fishing opportunities go, it is time to go out and catch a steelhead. We should be able to find some fish on the Skookumchuck and many of the other rivers on the west side. The positive side of the boat fishing being cancelled, bank angling should improve this year. In addition to steelhead the crabbing and squiding have been good. Even with the clam toxin issues and COVID-19 closures, when clamming opens it should be fantastic.

It is North of Falcon time again and I am going to make another push for the Kings at Minter Creek and Coho and Steelhead below the hatchery on the Satsop. If you have other ideas please let me know. Hal has been working hard on the Skykomish summer steelhead issue. For those that don't know, the Wild Fish Coalition has filled an intent to sue the state which could stop the release of smolt currently being raised and future ones. Stay tuned for request for action that will come out soon and when it does please respond in a timely fashion.

I pray we see major improvements this year as far as COVID-19. With the vaccine and close attention, I hope we can start meeting again soon. I will begin having monthly Zoom Board meetings in January.

### **Minter Creek Fishery and Cleanup**

Our club did 3 cleanups at Minter Creek. Two were with help from the Gig Harbor chapter and it is making a big difference to the area. During the season there were complaints about litter urination/defecation and noise from a neighbor of the hatchery and on the second clean up I took pictures a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile before the hatchery and <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile past the hatchery area and in both cases, they were much worse than the hatchery area itself. I sent the pictures to Tara Livinggood, the Minter Biologist with an explanation for her to go and look for herself to see what PSA has done. Unbeknownst to me she had gone to the facility to check things out for herself and found out it was cleaner than she had ever seen it. This helped her realize that even though we need to keep things clean, there is a neighbor that is not going to be happy regardless.

Another great thing this year was we got to fish when nice bright silvers were present. The bad part is that many people were snagging and it created a BIG enforcement issue. Jeff Summit, the local Game Warden, and I talked and he said it was the worst he had ever seen it and that he would like our help to educate the fishermen. I told him I would encourage our members to help with all those we saw snagging. I personally contacted around one hundred fishermen in the 3 days I fished. That said, this is going to be our biggest issue with getting more time earlier when the 10,000 kings came. I would like other suggestions to help solve this issue. I believe some signage may be a big help, but I need you to help with more ideas. If you have Ideas give me a call.

Below is what I sent to Tara on Minter creek issues.

Tara,

I was concerned enough from the e-mails you sent that I organized a second cleanup at Minter Creek on Saturday. I was relieved by what I found when I got there. I found only a small amount of trash relative to what had been there in years before the fishery was open to the public. This was also what I found when we cleaned up two weeks ago. In comparing the area where the fishermen park and fish, with the surrounding areas before the Minter hatchery as well as the area beyond the hatchery, the area where the fishermen are was much cleaner than the other areas. I feel the fishermen are having a positive impact on the area. The work we have organized with the SOF chapter of PSA and the Gig Harbor PSA, is improving the condition of the area, not adding to it. The hatchery personnel have also been helping by placing trash bags at the bridge for people to use as well as disposing of and replacing them as needed.

Although I didn't see any indication of defecation in the area, a restroom would certainly offer a solution to the problem. Our club would be willing to pay for the restroom for this year so that this issue could be addressed immediately.

I am leaving on a trip to Arizona on Tuesday but I am available to talk with you by phone on Monday. I am much more comfortable talking with you face to face, rather than through e-mails. I would really appreciate the opportunity to have a discussion about this topic and possibly walk the area with you. I feel this is an important issue and I am willing to put in the time and effort to see that this opportunity continues.


Your efforts with this fishery are truly appreciated and I look forward to working with you to find solutions.



# **Recipe of the Month** Roasted Caulíflower Soup

This is simple and delicious. The taste is so smooth and creamy most people think this is a fattening soup loaded with cream and potatoes. People are always shocked by how few ingredients are needed. prep: 15 mins

cook: 1 hr additional: 20 mins total: 1 hr 35 mins Servings: 6 Yield: 6 servings

## Ingredients

Ingredient Checklist

- 2 heads cauliflower, broken into florets
- olive oil cooking spray
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup olive oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 4 cloves garlic, chopped
- 6 cups water
- salt and ground black pepper to taste

### Directions

Instructions Checklist

- Step 1: Place the cauliflower florets into a large bowl of lightly salted water; allow to stand for 20 minutes. Drain well, and arrange on a sheet of heavy aluminum foil on a baking sheet. Spray the olive oil cooking spray evenly on the cauliflower.
- Step 2: Preheat the oven's broiler and set the oven rack about 6 inches from the heat source.
- Step 3: Broil the cauliflower until browned, 20 to 30 minutes.
- Step 4: Meanwhile, heat olive oil in a large soup pot, and cook the onion until translucent, about 5 minutes; stir in the garlic and roasted cauliflower. Pour in the water, season with salt and black pepper, and simmer until all the vegetables are tender, about 30 minutes. Blend the soup in the pot with an immersion hand blender until creamy and smooth.
