President's Message -- Carl Carver

I'm excited that we are back fishing Puget Sound after months of negotiations among state and tribal leaders. Yes an agreement was reached due to hard work, negotiation, and the Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) standing up for the rights of recreational fishermen/women. The department made it clear that they will no longer allow the tribes to have a choke-hold on our fisheries resources to meet their own greed. It is clear to me and many others that a few of the tribes are trying to dictate to other tribes as well as the citizens of this state what will happen with our fisheries. My personal opinion is that it's all about greed, the victim attitude, and the big money made selling the fish. They are exploiting our fishing resources for the almighty dollar. Our fish and their eggs are being sold here and overseas for more money than many can imagine (I'm doing research with tribes and others to bring you information on this subject at a later date. Stand by to be amazed). The bolt decision said 50% of the resource to the tribes not 75% to 90%. It's hard to be exact on the tribes take as there is little accountability for what they take. We have catch record cards and enforcement to ensure we are doing right by our fisheries. The tribes use ceremonial and subsistence fishing as a way to fish when fishing is closed to the sportsmen/women. There needs to be true conservation by the tribes as we sportsmen/women agree that escapement should be above all else including the tribes' ceremonial/subsistence fishery. Times have changed and subsistence has changed significantly due to casinos and other significant sources of revenue for the tribes. This whole subject needs to be revisited by WDFW and the tribes to protect our resource. Indiscriminant netting and use of modern commercial fishing methods can deplete the resource in no time as we have all seen. WDFW needs to stand up and be accountable to rectify these injustices to our fishing resources. They have taken some good steps recently on our behalf to get our Puget Sound fisheries reopened but need to stay diligent on getting real solutions to the long standing issues that have depleted our fish and impacted all the using groups.

You will see in the newsletter what great activities we are doing to support our fisheries and the many user groups. It's important that you, your family, friends, and others join in on the rally to save our Skokomish fishery (see article below for purpose, place and time) July 30th.

As I've written in several President's Messages and talked about at our general meetings, together/united we can make a difference in our fisheries issues by weighing in when called upon.

I am looking forward to working with all of you to continue the hard work/efforts underway to have fisheries that meet or exceed our needs now and into the future.

I hope to see you and talk with you at our upcoming meeting. We have a great speaker lined up, lots of goodies in our raffle, lively/fun dialogue, and member fishing reports which are always informative and entertaining. Sincerely,

<u>URGENT</u>: Important Rally July 30th at George Adams Hatchery at 1pm Need Membership Support to Make a Difference in Our Future Fisheries

Our own Frank Urabeck is leading this important event that is so important to the future of this fishery and all of our fisheries. There will be a significant turnout at this rally with several of the press and dignitaries being there as well as many avid sportsfishermen/women, their families, and friends. We are expecting in excess of 500 people to support. It is important that you bring our youth to show that saving our fisheries will help preserve the future of our fishing resource for them and all to enjoy. Let's make our SOF Auburn Chapter and Frank proud by supporting this important/significant event.

<u>A message from the PSA State Board</u>: "We need your participation at the Skokomish River at George Adams Hatchery on July 30, at 1 PM. The Skokomish tribe has had the Skokomish River deemed theirs by the Solicitor General and are not allowing any fishing from the river. This is an opinion and can be disputed long term but short term they are kicking us off the river. This is becoming a precedent from some tribes to start claiming rivers and remove access to our fish. We cannot allow river closures by certain tribes to shut us off the rivers to our state hatcheries. The news media will be there. Please join us.

In a June 9 op-ed article, published in the Shelton-Mason County Journal, Lorraine Loomis, Chair of the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission, stressed the importance of cooperation between the co-managers of the salmon resource (Puget Sound tribes and the State of Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife), and the need to work together on fish habitat protection and restoration, as well as seeking greater production of salmon through our hatchery programs. We agree with Ms. Loomis. We would like to see the Skokomish tribe reverse their decision. Working together in unity with the tribes is in both of our best interests. A popular recreational salmon fishery on the Skokomish River this year is closed. Not for conservation concerns, but rather another example of a broken system of state-tribal co-management in Puget Sound. Which river and marine area is next?

On July 30, at 1:00 PM, a coalition of recreational fishing organizations will come together on the Skokomish River to stand up for fairness in the management of our fisheries. We hope you will attend and advocate for fair and truly cooperative management (i.e. – "co-management") – something that is sorely missing today.

We've already outlined how the "North of Falcon" process and Puget Sound state-tribal comanagement is broken and in need of reform. Last year, central Puget Sound was shut down for salmon fishing due to policy demands of a single tribe. In recent years the Puyallup River has been largely closed to recreational salmon fishing – once again not for conservation concerns. The construction of the new Point No Point boat launch in Kitsap County: blocked due to tribal policy objections.

Now anglers will be barred from fishing for hatchery Chinook on the Skokomish River, hatchery fish that they help pay to produce.

On July 30, you will have a chance to stand up for fairness and cooperation in Puget Sound fishery co-management. It might be the Skokomish River this year...but what about next year???

Please remember that our message will best resonate with the public, opinion leaders, and politicians if it is respectful and considerate! This rally is about fairness in opportunity and the management of our State's fisheries. Also, bring your kids and grandkids as this is all about their fishing future too.

Tip of the Month – Salmon Hoochies Duane Horton

When tying up leaders for salmon hoochie's try using Gamakatsu big river hooks in either 4/0 or 5/0. They are sticky sharp for a good penetration and their unique bend makes it very hard for the fish to dislodge the hook. You will see a much higher hook and land ratio with the big river style over the tradition Octopus style hooks.



Also when tying the second hook try holding the first hook upside down so that your hooks will be facing in the opposite direction of each other when you have your hoochie rigged up. This will also greatly help in a higher hook up ratio.

Floats for Sale by SOF

SOF purchased Paulownia wood floats (similar to Thill balsa floats) from Auburn S&M at a deep discount and is offering them to members. They are slightly blemished and were rejected by Beau Mac because the brass ring at the bottom is not well seated. This is probably not a problem if a bead is used below the float, but can be easily fixed by applying silicone or heating the ring to melt the glue to allow reseating. They sell at Sportco for \$3 each. There are six sizes: 1/4 oz, 3/8 oz, 1/2 oz, 5/8 oz, 3/4 oz, and 1 oz. Most bags include a bobber stop and two beads for each float. They are priced as below:

18 bags of 18 floats--3 each of all six sizes for \$20
2 bags of 15 floats--3 of each size (except 3/4 oz) for \$17
19 bags of 12 floats--3 of each of the four smallest sizes for \$12
3 bags of 12 floats--4 each of 5/8, 3/8, and 1/4 oz for \$10
23 bags of 20 floats--10 of each of the two smallest sizes for \$15 (No bobber stops or beads in many of these bags because we ran out.)



Recipe of the Month

Susan Powter's Meatloaf

Because...you know...there's nothing better than homemade meatloaf!

Meatloaf

As American as . . .

But let's face it, meatloaf has always been kind of a "gaggy" food. With all due respect to the loaf made of meat, it's common! On the table once a week for forever.

Meatloaf needs a bit of an overhaul, and who better to do it than Yankee Doodle Sue? With the enthusiasm of a bornagain anything, I've reinvented the MEATLOAF. Thank you.

I can't tell you how good this new and improved, lower-fat MEATLOAF is. You could enter this sucker into any state fair contest in the country—even if it's the baking contest. Let everyone else bring their best muffins and pies. Rile 'em up a bit by putting your MEATLOAF down on the counter. Stick a HUGE American flag through the center. That'll get 'em going. Oh, the judges will be mad at first, but once they get a taste of this low-fat, meatier-than-meaty loaf, they'll forgive your lack of judgment and you'll win.

Crafty Cooking Suggestions: Double the recipe and make two loaves at once. Freeze one and pull it out when you need it. How crafty is that?

I suppose you could get even craftier and get some of that goop in tubes that you decorate cakes with and draw an American flag on the top if you like . . . I told you I wasn't good at the crafty stuff.

Fancy Schmancy

You're laughing, aren't ya? You don't think there is such a thing as meatloaf getting fancy?

How about pâté. Yeah, pâté. As in about as fancy as you can get. People will rave about your pâté, your *meatloaf* pâté. Don't you love that?

Take your loaf—that sounds appealing—and spread it over your favorite low-fat cracker—not the whole loaf, just a bit. Smear, smear, smear it over, add a little salt, and some parsley if you really want to go overboard...



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Cooking spray ³/₄ lb lean ground beef (10 percent fat) 1 cup chopped onion 1 cup chopped carrots 1 cup chopped celery 2 tsp chopped garlic 3 egg whites ¹/₂ cup bread crumbs ¹/₄ cup bread crumbs ¹/₄ cup ketchup ¹/₄ cup beef bouillon 1 tsp basil ¹/₂ tsp oregano 1 tsp salt ¹/₂ tsp pepper

1 cup finely chopped potatoes

¹/₄ cup chopped parsley

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Sauté onion, carrots, and celery in a nonstick pan with a little cooking spray until soft. Set aside until cool. Add all other ingredients to chopped meat.

Form mixture into a loaf about 4 inches high and place on lightly oiled baking pan (use light oil

spray). Cover with aluminum foil.

Bake for 30 minutes. Remove foil and bake 30 minutes more.

Let meatloaf rest 10 minutes, then slice and serve with your favorite sauce or gravy.
