
May Speaker - Rob Larsen

What to expect when launching from Point Defiance Marina

Frank Urabeck and a group met with Metro Parks Tacoma to discuss the parking issues at the Point Defiance Marina.

Here are a couple instructions sheets from that meeting. You can print the half-sheet 5-step instructions and keep them in your vehicle.

Alternative parking available for boaters using Point Defiance launches Metro Parks Tacoma will run free shuttle to and from launch area

Ongoing Point Defiance Park waterfront construction means boaters launching from Point Defiance Marina again must use alternative parking for their trailers this season.

Until extensive waterfront improvements are complete, little parking will be available close to the launch. However, thanks to an arrangement with Tacoma Public Schools, boaters again will be able to park their trailers at Point Defiance Elementary School, 4330 N. Visscher St., and take advantage of a free shuttle between the school and launch. The school is about a mile away from the launch, almost due south on Pearl Street.

The parking and shuttle will be available from 4 a.m. to 8 p.m. [as needed] on weekends starting Saturday, May 5, and seven days a week from June 18 through Sept. 3. Boaters should follow these instructions (which will be provided at the launch):

- Launch your boat.
- Drive your trailer to Point Defiance Elementary School, 4330 N. Visscher St., and park in the designated area.
- Look for the "Shuttle" sign and wait for the next shuttle. It will take you back to the launch.
- Once you bring your boat in, tie it up at the launch and go to the shuttle pick-up area.
- The shuttle will take you back to the school. Drive back to the launch and retrieve your boat.

Boaters are asked to follow the signage at the school and to park in the designated area. Out of courtesy for school neighbors, boaters also are asked to park inside the lot and not on the streets.



This year's chinook fishing at Point Defiance Park may be some of the best in recent memory – a 40 percent larger return than usual – said Phedra Redifer, regional parks manager for Metro Parks. That prediction, the curtailment of coastal and north sound fishing, and Point Defiance Marina's status as the region's largest public boat launch, add up to Metro Parks staff getting ready for a busy season.

"We know Point Defiance Marina is going to attract boaters from all over the region," Redifer said. "We're still in the midst of improvements at the waterfront, so we ask everyone to bring their patience as they launch and retrieve their boats.

Contractors continue to work on a waterfront project that includes a pedestrian trail and walkway connecting the park with Ruston Way. When it opens, the "Wilson Way" bridge – named for retired Metro Parks Executive Director Jack C. Wilson – will feature amazing views of Puget Sound, the Olympic Mountains and Mount Rainier.

Redifer said the park district is pursuing additional parking options. If they become available, Metro Parks will announce them at PointDefianceMarina.com. The website DestinationPointDefiance.org posts regular updates about construction impacts as well as information Point Defiance Park construction projects.

Boaters also can try these ideas:

- Use a buddy system so that someone drops you and your boat off and comes back to pick you up when you return.
- Store your boat at the marina. (Housing is limited to boats under 17 feet long. For more information, call (253) 404-3970 or go to metroparkstacoma.org/kayak-boat-storage.)


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
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Ken Kumasawa Memorial Youth Camp

Flaming Geyser State Park: Juvenile Steelhead Release

Some 10,000 wild brood derived juvenile steelhead smolts were released from Brice Ponds, Flaming Geyser State Park, on Saturday, May 12 into lower Christy Creek so they can enter the Green River. This is an element of the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife supplementation program that has documented success that might be applied to the Skagit River basin and even to jump start resurrection of the now essentially extinct Cedar River wild steelhead run. Our friend, Brodie Antipa, WDFW senior hatchery biologist, was at the event to share how success of the Green River program has been validated.

SOF members helped with the release, which included removing the bird screening and cleaning of the two ponds as well as guiding the smolts to the pond outlet drains. We were joined by volunteers from the Green—Duwamish Chapter, Trout Unlimited, led by Kay Glass. Also engaged were some of the Boy Scouts that helped us with the March 3 set up, led by Eagle candidate, Wyatt Pritchard. Wyatt installed the new access gate near the Dick Brice Memorial stone. He will be doing other work this summer as part of his Eagle project.

Floats for Sale by SOF

SOF purchased Paulownia wood floats (similar to Thill balsa floats) from Auburn S&M at a deep discount and is offering them to members. They are slightly blemished and were rejected by Beau Mac because the brass ring at the bottom is not well seated. This is probably not a problem if a bead is used below the float, but can be easily fixed by applying silicone or heating the ring to melt the glue to allow reseating. They sell at Sportco for \$3 each. There are six sizes: 1/4 oz, 3/8 oz, 1/2 oz, 5/8 oz, 3/4 oz, and 1 oz. Most bags include a bobber stop and two beads for each float. They are priced as below:

- 18 bags of 18 floats--3 each of all six sizes for \$20
- 2 bags of 15 floats--3 of each size (except 3/4 oz) for \$17
- 19 bags of 12 floats--3 of each of the four smallest sizes for \$12
- 3 bags of 12 floats--4 each of 5/8, 3/8, and 1/4 oz for \$10
- 23 bags of 20 floats--10 of each of the two smallest sizes for \$15 (No bobber stops or beads in many of these bags because we ran out.)



LOWER COLUMBIA STURGEON RETENTION OPENER

MONDAYS, WEDNESDAYS, AND SATURDAYS
MAY 14 THROUGH JUNE 4





Season: Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays May 14 through June 4, 10 days. Area: Mainstem Columbia River from the Wauna powerlines downstream to the mouth at Buoy 10, including Youngs Bay, and all adjacent Washington tributaries. Allowable Catch: Up to 2,960 white sturgeon.

Legal Size: 44-inch minimum and 50-inch maximum fork length. (Fork length is measured in a straight line from the tip of the nose to the fork in the caudal fin (tail) with the fish laying on its side on a flat surface, with the tape measure/ruler positioned flat under the fish)

Daily Bag Limit: One fish.

Annual Bag Limit: Two fish.

RETENTION OF GREEN STURGEON IS PROHIBITED

Additional Regulations: On days open to white sturgeon retention, angling for sturgeon is prohibited after 2 PM, including catch and release.



Recipe of the Month

Crockpot White Chicken Chili

Cheesy Crockpot White Chicken Chili. Not too spicy with TONS of flavor. Healthy, easy recipe and your slow cooker does all the work!

Yield: 6 servings **Prep Time:** 15 minutes

Cook Time: 2 to 3 hours (on high); 4 to 6 hours (on low) **Total Time:** 2 to 3 hours (on high); 4 to 6 hours (on low)

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 2 to 3 breasts)
- 4 cups (32 ounces) low-sodium chicken stock
- 2 (15-ounce) cans reduced-sodium white beans, such as white kidney beans, cannellini, or Great Northern beans, rinsed and drained
- 2 (4.5-ounce) cans diced green chiles
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 small (or 1/2 large) yellow onion, finely diced
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- Fresh lime wedges
- For serving (the toppings add important flavor, so LOAD IT UP!): diced jalapeno, diced avocado, nonfat sour cream or plain Greek yogurt, shredded cheese, crushed tortilla chips

Directions:

- 1. Place chicken in the bottom of a 6-quart or larger slow cooker. Top with the chicken broth, white beans, green chiles, garlic, onion, cumin, oregano, salt, and cayenne. Stir to combine. Cover and cook on low for 4 to 6 hours or high for 2 to 4 hours, until the chicken is cooked through. Remove the chicken breasts to a plate. Once cool enough to handle, shred and set aside.
- 2. With an <u>immersion blender</u>, puree a portion of the chili to thicken it, leaving some of the beans whole. (You can also transfer a few ladlefuls of the chili to a food processor and roughly blend, then stir the blended portion back into the chili.) Stir in the shredded chicken and cilantro. Portion into bowls and top with a squeeze of fresh lime juice. Add any other desired toppings and enjoy.
- Know thy slow cooker! If yours cooks exceptionally quickly, be sure to watch the cooking time carefully and check it early, as chicken breasts more easily dry out in the crock pot. My chicken was ready on high after 2 1/2 hours.
- Store leftovers in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 5 days or freeze for up to 2 months. Let thaw overnight in the refrigerator.
